How to be a Toastmaster of the Meeting

A Toastmaster meeting is a marvel of interrelated parts when it runs smoothly and a ineffective waste of time when done poorly. Northwestern Toastmasters has developed a meeting process that allows for fun and good humor while maintaining a structure that makes

the most of our limited spare time. The key to our success is the not the meeting roles themselves but what we emphasize and prioritize in each function. The following is one person's opinion (albeit a person I admire and respect.....ME) of what is important and the priorities in each of our meeting functions:

Toastmaster:

This is the person who manages the educational portion of our meetings. The Toastmaster sets the tone for the meeting and supports the members in other roles through quality introductions. The priorities are:

1) Proper Sequence of Segments: The Toastmaster needs to introduce each function as called for in the agenda. If the Toastmaster misses a function, the meeting does not achieve its objectives. If the segments are introduced out of sequence, the process is less effective. For example, if the Wordmaster is recognized after the Table Topics, the impromptu speakers will not have the challenge of expanding their vocabulary.

2) Quality Introductions of Segments: The introduction of a speaker or function is intended to prepare the audience to get the most from the presentation. The Toastmaster needs to show enthusiasm for the segment to follow and where appropriate for the person presenting. The introduction needs to take into account the people in the audience. If there are visitors or new members in attendance, the Toastmaster should add details to the introduction to help them understand what is taking place. It should also include the manual and time to assist our evaluators and timers. The reality is that if the Toastmaster does not appear excited to see the next segment, why should the audience.

3) Energizing Warm-up: The Toastmaster of a meeting is free to select a theme for the meeting. The theme may be educational (provide new information about a topic), entertaining (usually something humorous or inspiring), or celebratory (honoring a holiday or season). The warm-up should not be too long or the audience may be "tired" by the time the scheduled speakers present.

4) Fill time: Finally, the Toastmaster should work to avoid pockets of silence during the meeting. For example, while members are voting their attention will not be on an introduction. Therefore, the Toastmaster may consider a very short story or quote consistent with the meetings theme. An experienced Toastmaster may immediately follow a presentation with a one-line comment that shows that the Toastmaster was listening and helps the audience relate to the theme.
