## October 16, 2007 Meeting Notes by Scott Anderson, Secretary



Brian Davidson called the Northwestern Toastmaster's meeting to order. There were no announcements, no old business, and no new business to discuss.

Evander Woo was the Toastmaster for the evening. His theme was friendship. Evander began by defining friendship. He then enumerated distinct degrees of friendship with several pertinent colloquialisms.

Marcia Barney was the table topics master for the evening. She called on the Wordmaster, Scott Anderson, to give the word for the meeting. The word was urbane. Marcia called on five impromptu speakers: Butch, Mary, Elaine, Fran, and Scott to speak on various topics regarding friendship.

Barbara Schanker was the first prepared speaker for the evening. Her speech was entitled "The Debate Continues." This was the fourth speech in the Persuasive Speaking Manual. Barbara's intent was to persuade the audience regarding the proposed locations for a new hospital. Her use of visual aids was great. Her map fell but she recovered in a very polished and professional manner. Also memorable was her use of the newspaper. She focused on the misinformation campaign by Baptist Hospital. She concluded by establishing that "despite the hype" Clemmons would retain its village feel. Barbara then opened up the question and answer session. She maintained control and handled the jackals, I mean audience, quite well. This is an emotional debate and people's emotions tend to get the better of them. Barbara persuaded the audience and controlled the question and answer session in an exemplary manner.

Joel Schanker was the final prepared speaker for the evening. His speech was entitled "It's Not Too Early." This was the tenth speech from the Basic Manual. Joel began by speaking about Jim Key's career and a specific speech Jim recently delivered, "Permission to Dream." By sharing Jim's public speaking origins, Joel gave the audience permission to dream for greatness in our own public speaking endeavors. Speech Contests are a must for personal and professional growth in public speaking. Joel enumerated sundry benefits to starting early on contest speech preparation: refinement of thought, rough passages become smooth, and gestures become flowing and natural. Joel ended by stating a wonderful, concise thought: "Practice until you are your presentation."

Pam was the General Evaluator for the meeting. She commented on the excellent punctuality and structure of the meeting. She liked that Marcia called on five table topics speakers to augment the scheduled prepared speakers. Don Barnett evaluated Barbara's speech. He admired Barbara's smooth and professional presence. The exact phrase was "...it fell and I admire you for not cursing." I sincerely hope nothing ever falls in one of Don's speeches. Don suggested the use of labels to clarify the map for the audience. He commented on Barbara's genuine approach to the material. Brian Davidson evaluated Joel Schanker's speech. Brian began his evaluation by candidly confessing "One of the things I noticed tonight, because I was paying more attention..." The greatest irony is I have no idea what he noticed, since I was too busy chuckling about his not paying attention. Brian commented on Joel's appropriate use of body language throughout the speech. Later, Brian stated that "it doesn't have to be good to detract." Your Secretary

was relieved to learn that nugget of wisdom from our distinguished president. Brian suggested that Jim Key was not well known enough for the audience to identify with him...hmmm we are all in Toastmaster's right? He recommended using more examples of personal experience rather than "living vicariously" through the public speaking exploits of others. John, our self-proclaimed meek and mild-mannered urbane web master, was the grammarian for the meeting. He commented on Brian and Marcia's side conversation. He commented on the Secretary's aversion to punctuation and proclivity to join everything with an "and." John pointed out that Joel substitutes "nows" for "ands". There were a few "uhs" and some sentence restarts.

Control of the meeting returned to our president Brian Davidson. Scott won the ribbon for Best Table Topics. Brian won the ribbon for the Best Evaluator. Barbara won the ribbon for the Best Speaker. John closed the meeting by telling a joke...remind me never to trick-or-treat in his neighborhood.

That is because you are a Northwestern Toastmaster and you are meeting with your personal public speaking advisory council. Yes, when all of us joined

Toastmasters we pledged to help one another learn the finer art of public speaking. So let's use the feedback we will receive over the next few weeks. Why the next few weeks? Because the holiday season is upon us and we will be presented opportunities to shine in front of large or small groups of listeners. Let's take a look at a couple of examples.

Will you be going to a dinner party over the holidays that making a Toast would be appropriate? Not too many folks like to give a toast and fewer have the skill to give a good toast. Did you know that we have a manual dedicated to special occasion speeches and how to give a toast is one of the projects? Using this guide you should keep the Toast short. This helps because it should be well practiced, especially if you use humor. Be as positive as you can. While you are at it dress for the occasion because if you look good you will feel more confident. The more confident you feel the more meaningful your message will be.

Are you the supervisor at work and have to present awards to some of your co-workers at the office party? Well, once again, you can quickly get a handle on this through your experiences at Toastmasters every other Tuesday night. However, you might want to practice with the help of a manual speech or just review the manual and project before the occasion. By the way, you should also be aware that there is a right way and a better way to accept an award. Just remember if the best you have is "Thanks, but I really don't deserve this" you will have an awful lot of folks in the audience agreeing with you.
