## Listen to This!

The first thing we think of when we hear the word "communicate" is usually "speak." Our most used and useful form of communication is listening. More importantly the skill of listening plays a significant role in our ability to speak.

When you are put "on the spot" in an important meeting or conversation a mental block may occur. That mental block may be the result of a question by your boss, an important inquiry by your spouse, or a public spotlight. A great way to overcome this phenomenon is to listen intently. If you concentrate on the question or issue at hand the interfering emotions will be diminished or eliminated.

The ability to concentrate under stressful circumstances is a learned behavior. You can develop this ability by visualizing situations. For example, in Table Topics sessions assume that you will be called to answer the question. Listen intently to what the Table Topics Master says while paying close attention to their body language. Wait until the question is finished before you start to formulate your answer - postpone the mental response until you have all the information.

Be a patient listener. Not only should you not interrupt a speaker, but when it is your turn to speak do so deliberately. Avoid filler words and make friends with those few beats of silent deliberation before you start to speak.

Our evaluation sessions offer a marvelous forum for practicing listening - and not just when we are the speaker being evaluated or evaluating. Evaluations are not a time for entertainment so listen to the evaluator for the constructive content of the words. Not only will you become a better listener, you could pick up some valuable speaking tips.

The role of grammarian, on the other hand, is frequently a gold mine of listening entertainment. By listening like a grammarian even when we are not we can develop our ability to concentrate as well as enjoy the meeting even more.

Listen more effectively and you'll also probably become a better speaker as a bonus.
