Using Notes

With several speeches under my belt I thought I had lost the fear of losing my place or forgetting my speech. That was until I recently participated in an Area Contest. I had presented the same speech several times in front of different audiences and my wife had suffered through it several dozens of times. No way was I going to lose my place or have my mind go blank. But when least expected, it happened. What the heck did I just say, what comes next, did I just skip the whole body of my speech. Fortunately, just the act of reaching into my jacket pocket to retrieve my script gave me enough time to regain my composure and move forward to the end of my speech. I still think I left out about three of the most important paragraphs of my speech but I lived and who knows if the audience was any less impressed from not hearing the left out parts of my speech. At least I can be sure that I did not go over the time limit.

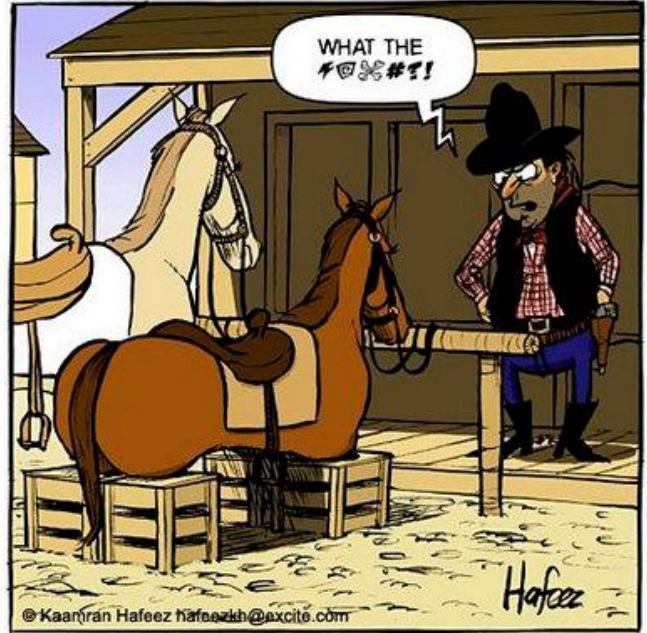
Inexperienced and experienced speakers, there is nothing more valuable than having well prepared notes or a script in your possession when presenting your talk. You may not have to refer to them but if you do you might consider the following to make your use of notes less distracting to your audience.

1. Make sure the lectern is high enough so you can stand straight and make eye contact with your audience without having to bow your head to read.
2. Consider getting rid of any index cards or small slips of paper. Drop these or get them out of order and you might be in real trouble.
3. Consider using full sheets of paper for your notes and use a large font that is easy to read even if you forget to bring your glasses to the front of the room.
4. Be familiar with how you laid out your speech on the pages. Don't cut a paragraph between two pages. Consider putting the opening and closing paragraphs on their own pages as a reminder that you may need to change your voice inflection, volume or body language.
5. Use a highlighter to mark key words or ideas. Yes, your whole speech is important but if you highlight the whole speech nothing will stand out to jog your memory.
6. Read ahead. Use the times that you are intentionally pausing to emphasize a point or when waiting for the audience to stop laughing to glance at your notes to refresh your thoughts and where you are in your remarks.

It is fair to expect that as you become a more experienced speaker you may use your notes less frequently and you may begin just using an outline instead of a word for word written script. In fact as we move through the advanced manuals there are projects to help us practice not using notes. However, never lose

your skill of using notes effectively because you may one day be called upon to present someone else's speech or you may be in front of a new and large crowd that may make you feel uncertain of yourself. Yes reading from a script or using notes when presenting a speech is a skill and should not be dismissed as only a crutch for new and timid speakers.
