Craig Thrift, Toastmaster of the meeting, chose the theme, "Motivating People". Craig began by identifying the conditions where motivation is key

element to meeting goals. As the evening progressed, he explained the characteristics leaders need in order to motivate, methods of motivating people, and the benefits of motivating individuals to meet goals.

Other members assisting with this meeting's activities included Nancy Wilson as Grammarian, Jeff Walker as Timer, and Elaine Wiles as Vote Counter. Florian Neuhauser, the Wordmaster for the evening, chose "myopic" as the word for the evening. Myopic is an adjective meaning shortsighted.

Christa Neuhauser was the Table Topics Master this meeting. She challenged Steve Albon about his motivation to join Toastmasters. Pam Windley was asked to describe outside motivators to complete a goal. Florian Neuhauser was given the topic of motivating the sales people of Baskin Robbins to increase ice cream sales. Marcia Barney described the negative motivation that inspired her to join Northwestern Toastmasters and its leadership.

The Schanker team presented prepared speeches this evening.

Barbara Schanker presented Project # 2, "The Radio Talk Show" from the Public Relations Manual. She described the "Benefits of Living in the Winston-Salem/Triad Area". Afterwards, she was asked questions from the Toastmasters regarding her talk. Barbara gave a very strong case for why the Schankers retired in Winston-Salem.

Joel Schanker's presentation came from Project # 5 of the Informational Speaking Manual. His speech was called "Discovering Discovery". Joel's speech

examined the different styles of exploring the world whether via the easy chair or personal experience. He encouraged us to take a "hands on" approach to learning about the environment, people, and foods that are available both near and far.

The General Evaluator of the evening was Barbie Morgan. Barbara Schanker was evaluated by Brian Davidson and Joel Schanker was evaluated by Marcia Barney.
